

Recruiting Scam Awareness

LifeMine has had reports of impersonation scams in which someone pretends to be a LifeMine recruiter or employee in an apparent attempt to steal sensitive information or money from their targets. Please review below to understand ways to evaluate the legitimacy of job-related communications from LifeMine Therapeutics.

What does this mean?

1. A person or group is impersonating LifeMine recruiters and employees in an apparent attempt to scam potential job applicants. These impersonators are sending messages, typically via email, advertising job opportunities, setting up fake interviews, providing fake contracts and fake checks. This is a scam— if you receive such a message, please do not engage.
2. Many of the fake roles are described as remote or medical administrative assistant though the scam is not limited to those types of roles.
3. This is a common scam tactic. The scammers impersonate other companies as well, so the tips provided here may also be applicable to messages purporting to be from other companies.

How can I recognize an imposter?

1. If you receive an email about a job opportunity at LifeMine it should be from someone with an email address ending in @lifeminetx.com. Double-check the sender information— some imposters are very good at making their email address look official even when it is not.
 - If you suspect the message is not legitimate, do not respond!
 - If you receive an email from someone unknown to you claiming to be from or represent LifeMine, verify legitimacy by forwarding the email or message to humanresources@lifeminetx.com and explain that you would like help understanding if a message really came from LifeMine or someone acting on LifeMine's behalf.
2. We do not ask candidates to purchase equipment, make any financial transactions, or provide any banking information. Do not follow any such instruction!
3. LifeMine does not use chat apps to communicate with candidates (e.g., Skype Chat)

I received an email about a job opportunity at LifeMine without applying. What should I do?

1. If the email came from a lifeminetx.com email address (always double-check), it's probably legitimate! We hope you'll talk to us about the opportunity to work for LifeMine.
 - Note that we'd never ask you to send us money or give us bank account information, so if that happens, it's probably a scam.
2. LifeMine, and its partners, do not typically use chat apps to communicate with candidates (e.g., Skype Chat)
3. For most roles, there is usually a zoom call as a preliminary introduction and then a face-to-face interview element.
4. If you receive an email from someone unknown to you claiming to be from or represent LifeMine to verify legitimacy you can forward the email or message to humanresources@lifeminetx.com.
